Ordering directions (*This same info was copied from an email I sent to you.*)

Everyone will order their preschooler/Jrk (18m+) the required books below, on their own, from Abeka.com. (Direct links below in each age subsection). It is always free shipping on Abeka, so each mom will order on their own and it will come right to them.

If your preschooler is under 18m at the start of the school year you don't need to order anything.

If they give you the option of "bound" or "unbound" choose "bound" (otherwise it's just loose sheets getting lost and mixed up).

Memoria Press vs Abeka preschool

Handwriting thoughts for 4's:

Like most four-year-old curriculums, there is a big push to teach them to write at such a young age. I think this is a mistake and paves the way for bad handwriting habits in most children. The dexterity that develops between 4 yrs and 3rd grade is astronomical. Their joints are still growing and developing.

Certainly 4 yr olds can be taught to write, but with much difficulty and frustration (for mom and child) that could have been avoided had they held off for a couple years. They do not need to write to learn how to read.

However, most 4 yr old phonics curricula (MP and Abeka included) include lots of writing. This was not the way it was done for the last thousand years. Students would learn to read, as its own subject, and then a dedicated handwriting teacher would come to the village and teach the students to write. If you couldn't get that guy to come then the teacher did the best he could and taught, but handwriting was its own subject, not done for the purpose of phonics instruction but solely focused on the skill of writing.

When/if you do have the children learn to write letters, it must be a dedicated time, maybe where you sit and drink your coffee and ensure they hold the pencil correctly, proper posture, correct formation of letters. **It is better to do very, very little with complete excellence than to do lots poorly.**

I see many students come to co-op from public schools or just poor learned habits holding pencils in the most bizarre ways and some with unreadable writing. By third grade it becomes nearly impossible to train the habits out of them. It would require the diligent daily perseverance of the mother. So, the lesson learned is: *don't allow bad habits to form in the first place.*

I mention this because there are two books in the K4 student kit that are intensive writing. The Cursive ABC Writing Tablet and Cursive Writing with Phonics. Two ways to go about that--

1. You could use them for the next 2 years at a slow pace and they would be perfectly appropriate and serve you well. For learning handwriting they are very good books. Or,
2. you could *not* order them and save money. You'd just need to order items individually and not the grouped link below (*which you wouldn't get the 5% full package discount-- but eliminating those two books would still be a cheaper deal*).
3. Elisheva actually loved the cursive book and asked to do it. Up to you- it's for at home so no pressure. If you don't finish it, it's a perfectly suitable cursive book for kindergarten too.

If you were to get just one over the other, I'd do the Cursive Writing with Phonics over the writing tablet but they are both very similar. You can look them up individually to see PDF samples. They are excellent books (I ordered both to see) but you definitely won't need both all in one year (in my opinion). Again, handwriting is done best with excellence vs doing lots poorly. You need to know your student, his ability level, and your patience level 😊 There is truly no rush on handwriting. Either way- handwriting will be mostly for home. **Those two books won't be assigned for class.** They will write in class but not as much as those books would call for. We'll leave that at home under a parent's watchful eye and discretion.

Cursive for 4 year olds?!

Lastly - it might be surprising to see cursive in a 4 yr old set but their reasoning is really good (they answer why cursive first in this blog article: [Answers to Two Cursive Questions: Why Teach Cursive, and Why Teach Cursive First - Abeka](#)).

Cursive was always taught first up until the 1950s. I personally have done both ways-- cursive first and also not--I will say of my kids who learned cursive first, they were the ones most likely to write in cursive later. Not 100% of them-- but 3/4 of the oldest 4 mostly write in cursive. Deklan (my fourth child) won't write in anything but cursive.

So, I personally chose the cursive option for Elisheva BUT they do have a button to choose the manuscript if parents want. Again, either is fine -- it won't affect co-op since those 2 books are optional and for at home. I will have them on the checklist schedule as optional assignments--so they just won't appear on Mondays

Books you will NEED to buy for home:

MATH

Do you have a phonics curriculum? You will need one ---the above books are just what you have to have for co-op but are only a piece of the MP phonics curriculum. I have used it with my daughter and it taught her to read very well so I can recommend it.

The rest of the phonics curriculum (see pg 5 of MP catalog) includes:

- **Copybook I**
- **Primary Phonics Readers Set 1** (used more towards the end of the year, simple paper readers but the stories are fun and interesting and match what phonics they've learned)
- **Spiral bound small book called Classical Phonics** –this is used through second grade and contains word lists to practice reading with –essential book.
- **Phonics Flashcards** (also used through second grade—you'll refer to these often. We'll cover them on Mondays but they are used throughout the week).
- **First Start Reading Teacher Guide** (this goes with the First Start Reader Workbooks. It has good discussion prompts to make the stories more interesting. When they only know a handful of sounds the stories are short and boring—you asking question like “why do you think the rat sat on the cat?” make story time fun.
- **Cut & Paste Book** (works on their motor skills as well as reviewing phonic sounds)
- **Nature Reader**

Also great to own but not required:

- **Children's Bible**
(we have the Children's Bible and Christian Studies Enrichment, we'll cover the Bible readings in class so you don't need to buy it unless you want to)
- **Kindergarten Literature Read-alouds**
(we follow the MP read-aloud schedule in the curriculum manual, we have all the read-alouds, you don't need to buy unless for your own library, nearly all can be found at library or ebay.com/thriftbooks.com)
- **Poetry Books**
We will cover the MP slated poems in class

(learning about a classical piece and listening to it) - we will cover this in class

I personally display these in my home—one student memorized all of them by having them all on the wall and reviewing them weekly—beautiful God honoring works of art.

Reading Class 1

This class is phonics and some handwriting. It is a first grade class though we call it Reading Class 1. This allows parents to put their students in the appropriate class without the stigma of "grade" level.

This class will begin with *First Start Reading E* and learn the last of the more difficult phonetic sounds and then go into readers like *Frog and Toad* and *Little Bear*. They will soon progress into beautiful children's picture books that have simple words like *Make Way for Ducklings* and *Miss Rumphius*. The reading assignments will build to 5 pages with a good sized paragraph on each page. They are getting ready to read chapter books in second grade. A common wonder is "Should my intelligent 4 year old be in first grade or kindergarten?" I have only seen it once where a 5 year old really was meant for first grade, but they basically need to be ready to read *Frog and Toad*. Ideally, they are not sounding out basic words anymore like jet or dog but rather just read them quickly. If they are reading some—but really still learning and sounding words out, and they are at a kindergarten age—keep them in kinder—there is no rush.

NOTE: I recommend the StoryTime TEACHER guides for the continuation of phonics training that is specifically curtailed to the reading books we are doing in class (there will be various mid-week lessons that go over phonic instruction that will accompany their reading). Without the teacher manuals it would not be a complete phonics curriculum. The student books might also be difficult to complete without the teacher manual.

Books you need for Spelling Class 1:

Spelling class is a phonics based class—so truly it is an extension of phonics learning

- Memoria Press Traditional Spelling I Student Workbook** (heavily recommend the Teacher Manual for answers and directions on what to do)
- Memoria Press Traditional Spelling I Practice Sheets**

Math Games and Cursive: At co-op we will do math games to help master addition facts using the “Addition Facts that Stick” curriculum from WellTrainedMind.com. No purchase is required. On the non-lesson weeks, the math games may be shorter and we will try and get some cursive done. Students will keep up with cursive at home per the Memoria Press

Spelling Class 2

Spelling class is a phonics based class—so truly it is an extension of phonics learning

Complete Prima Latina Set – the second graders will begin their first baby steps into latin. They will come to class having watched the video. We expect our moms to also watch as well. You are not required to do the workbooks like the students nor memorize the words, but we ask that all homeschool parents begin the process of *understanding* Latin as we are not a 5 day a week school and you are required to teach your child some in Latin. You don't have to know Latin to teach it –but you do need to know where to point them if they need to relearn something. I don't expect you to memorize a declension but I expect you to know what it is and where to point your student to it if they need to review. Same with conjugations. Same with vocab. Same with Latin sayings. Watch the video with the child while you are prepping dinner and that will do the trick. And for students who are too young, this is still very beneficial for the moms who plan the younger kids' days.

While the lesson plans I mentioned above are SO incredibly helpful, if you follow them to a T it may not work very well for your life. Last year, I tried using this student planner with my upper school kids and they at first didn't see the point. They said, "We already have the lesson plans why do we need this?" And I explained to them that it is in their benefit to assign the assignments from the lesson plan in a more balanced way. Perhaps you have sports or music lesson on a certain day and you need that day to be lighter—the lesson plans don't account for that. And while we do an entire day of school on Mondays, sometimes we are doing assignments from other days of the week, so if you are following the lesson plan exactly as given your Tuesday might be a really huge day. I've had upper school kids complain that their Tuesday is a huge day because they have to do all that we didn't do on Monday and also all of Tuesday. Using this planner allows you to balance out the week in a way that will work for you and also puts them in charge of their week (with your guidance). Also, the teachers will assign assignments that are not in the student planner. Being able to write this in, and other items like

Bible

Christian Studies I Student Book *Note: In 3rd grade they will cover the FIRST HALF of this book.*

- Optional: Golden Children's Bible - we'll cover the Bible readings in class so you don't need to buy those unless you want to or if you are absent and want to do the reading

Complete Latina Christiana Set – Trust me you need the whole set. This is the course for 3rd or 4th graders. They will come to class having watched the video. We expect our moms to also watch as well. You are not required to do the workbooks like the students nor memorize the words, but we ask that all homeschool parents begin the process of *understanding* Latin as we are not a 5 day a week school and you are required to teach your child some in latin. You don't have to know Latin to teach it –but you do need to know where to point them if they need to relearn something. - First Semester: ~~Memoria Press Astronomy Student Book~~
 - We will NOT fill out this book entirely in class
 - It has a lot of repetition which can be boring/unnecessary for that age in my opinion. We will use it as a guide for tracing the stars but we may not do much beyond that.
 - In class we will focus on: Learning and tracing the constellation, memorizing the 10 brightest stars, hearing the Greek myth story behind the constellation, finding the constellation in the “night sky” (we have a constellation projector)

 - If you are absent some day you may want the D’Aulaires Greek Myths Book. We will read from that regularly. It’s a great book. One the kids will read again and again. But optional purchase for this class. We will have a copy we read from in class.
- Second semester ~~Apologia Astronomy text book and student notebooking journal (always get the newest edition)~~

Composition – Introduction to Composition student book or a Commonplace book. You don’t need the Teacher Manual—we’ll cover this book in class, no homework for this text. This will teach them how to formulate their thoughts and summarize what they heard in 3 complete sentences (practicing good handwriting, perfect spelling). This curriculum will have us progress to letter writing, book summaries, and more. NOTE: if you are a MP “box kit” buyer—you can choose the “customizable” curriculum package and choose this text instead of IEW Adventures in Writing and you’ll still get your package discount.

Q/A—

Question: Why don’t we use what MP offers IEW Adventures in Writing for 3rd grade?

Answer: They won’t complete the book by the end of the year (slightly annoying) and then what they do learn, so much of it is repeated in *Fable* for 4th grade. And for many third graders, *IEW* will require a LOT of hand holding and be a frustrating experience for some as they are still learning how to write, the bones in their hands are still forming, and it’s an every day writing course. Ours is just on Mondays.

MP’s *Intro to Comp* is much more gentle of an introduction. This has been very well received with our parents, especially as the students are now fully in classical education in third grade, with the addition of Latin, and states and capitals, and a more in depth Christian studies, it feels like a lot all at once, so it’s nice to have a gentle composition. And there are lots of years for *IEW*.

If you normally buy the full curriculum package and need to sub this out for *IEW* but want to still get the package discount search the term “customizable third grade curriculum” and that will give you options to sub)

Question: do we need to buy the literature books that go with Intro to Comp?

*Answer: You will **not** need those books, as portions will be read aloud in class. It is a no homework class, which is lovely. The teacher will read one to two pages of the book and then they will form a summary together in class. They will write what happened in the beginning Of the excerpt, what happens in the middle, and what happens at the end for a three sentence summary. In the beginning of the class, they will need lots of teacher assistance, formulating together as a class she writing it on the board, and they copying it into their notebooks. As the year moves on, they will begin to be able to do the summaries more independently.*

They will also learn some basic writing skills like how to write a letter and how to do a book summary. We will also focus on good penmanship, good handwriting, capital letters of the beginning, periods at the end, correct grammar usage, etc. All the things they are just trying to work on in third grade. It is definitely a much gentler introduction than IEW would have them do in third grade, which I actually preferred. There are lots of years to do IEW. And again, it is a no homework class.

I think some of the books they read from in intro to comp are actually assigned for the third grade literature so you might be buying them anyway, but they are not required for the intro to composition class. However, if your student is wondering what happens in between the excerpts that are read a lot in class, you might want to own the books so that you could read the in-between parts.

Timeline—Each student will have a personal Excelsior timeline book—a book to last a lifetime, it is hard back, high quality. \$40 (note this is NOT the timeline book that MP offers) Excelsior provides this book to each new student.

States and Capitals PART 1

For Geography we will do the first half of states and capitals, working on memorizing all 50 states and capitals and their spellings by the end of 4th grade. **You need the States and Capitals Student Book, Don't Know Much about 50 States book**, and optional is the teacher manual and the state flashcards. This class won't have homework but you may want the teacher manual for answers, you probably want the state flashcards--they correspond to the regions we are learning and your child will likely need to review at least once more at home each week to really memorize. In class only may not be enough. **We will NOT complete the entire states and capitals book in 1 year.** It is a nice gentle pace of one state per week + review and they'll complete it in 2 years.

Classical Studies—We alternate between TWO Classical Studies tracks (classes are striken if we don't offer this year):

1. D'Aulaire's Greek Myths- (2023, '25, '27, '29—odd start years)

a. This picture book is excellent. We will read excerpts from it in when we do Astronomy (we learn the story behind the constellations). And we also will offer it as a one year course for 3rd/4th combined.

Purchase: Student book OR commonplace book will work to take notes. Flashcards optional.

b. Tip: If you have an older child than 5th grade who hasn't read it I would recommend reading it as a read aloud for enjoyment by 7th grade as they'll review it some in Famous Men of Greece and then also give great perspective to the Iliad and Odyssey they read in 8th.

2. ~~Story of the World 1 (SOTW1) Activities, Geography, and Read Aloud Picture Books (2024, '26, '28, '30 even start years)~~ The Activity book is different than the ~~SOTW1 reader~~ it does include a review of the story but it also has timeline, geography map work, great picture read alouds, and an activity/craft. It's really very fun! There are no required purchases for this class. We will provide the activity guide.

a. ~~Optional read SOTW1 at home~~ We will not actually read the SOTW1 in class and it would be optional to listen/read at home. If you have a busy week or you just listened to it last year, the class at Excelsior could stand alone so it is a non-homework class. To get the most out of the class I would say do read/listen to The SOTW1 at home prior to class it would definitely add to the class and be beneficial to the student, but it's not like they'd be lost in class if they didn't listen to it. We will not cover all 40+ lessons. We will end right where Rome begins (and then in 5th grade they will pick up with Rome in "Famous Men of Rome"). Or you can finish the Roman stories over the summer on in your free time for fun.

grade—kind of like a review of other content) OR A Beka's K5 cursive if you want more “frills” (the kinder cursive is more than ample for starting with and reviews phonics and simple sentences). No matter what grade you start cursive in, you should buy the “first” book because the lines are bigger and connecting the letters builds. If they grasp concepts quickly you can progress quickly and not do the entire book (if they are an older student) but I would start them on the kindergarten A Beka or First grade Memoria Press (depending if you want frills or no frills).

- **Literature Set and Literature Guides** – see MP catalog--These are their readers. They are working through wonderful classics building on their reading skills, expanding vocab, and comprehension. I LOVE the literature guides TEACHER manuals as we can have a discussion about what they've read *but I don't have to read the book!* It has the questions and answers RIGHT there for you. I do make them write out the vocab as I found they weren't learning it without writing it out. The enrichment suggestions each chapter can be really neat. In Mr. Popper's Penguins it suggested we write to a zoo about penguins and the San Diego zoo wrote us back and answered every question! Super fun. It has you track adventures on maps so you get map work. Dig deeper in history, Memorize poems etc. You could get by with just the teacher manual and save money by not purchasing the blank student guide. But literature is one of MP's shining subjects—by 7th grade the lit guides start to go deep and really focus on things they need to learn for college—literary devices and terms. So I heavily recommend the guides.)

History Read Alouds and Literature Read Alouds – These are TREASURES. Memory making time in my house! The children and I sit down and spend precious moments together. The MP curriculum manual schedules these books week by week. The history ones are an excellent way to learn history through a captivating novel. You can add dates and names to your timeline book. By 4th/5th grade I let my kids read the history read alouds independently. Note: in 3rd grade if you are doing the Story of the World 1 read aloud at home (in even year start dates—see above for Classical Studies) you can skip the MP History read alouds to take that off your plate as you will already be doing a History read aloud.

The literature read alouds we read together always. Lots of amazing discussion points. Typically a little above their reading level so good for read alouds though. Great moral stories. Such good family memories reading together!

1. **D’Aulaire’s Greek Myths- (2023, '25, '27, '29—odd start years)**
 - a. This picture book is excellent. We will read excerpts from it when we do Astronomy (we learn the story behind the constellations). And we also will offer it as a one year course for 3rd/4th combined. **Purchase: Student book OR commonplace book will work to take notes.** Flashcards optional. Teacher guide with answer key also optional (useful if you want the answer for at home—we will not complete the entire book in class).
 - b. Tip: If you have an older child than 5th grade who hasn’t read it I would recommend reading it as a read aloud for enjoyment by 7th grade as they’ll review it some in Famous Men of Greece and then also gives a great perspective to the Iliad and Odyssey they read in 8th.
2. **Story of the World 1 (SOTW1) Activities, Geography, and Read Aloud Picture Books (2024, '26, '28, '30— even start years)** The Activity book is different than the SOTW1 reader—it does include a review of the story but it also has timeline, geography map work, great picture read alouds, and an activity/craft. It’s really very fun! There are no required purchases for this class. We will provide the activity guide.

If you have a busy week or you just listened to it last year, the class at Excelsior could stand alone—so it is a non homework class. To get the most out of the class I would say do read/listen to The SOTW1 at home prior to class—it would definitely add to the class and be beneficial to the student, but it’s not like they’d be lost in class if they didn’t listen to it. We will not cover all 40+ lessons. We will end right where Rome begins (and

And I explained to them that it is in their benefit to assign the assignments from the lesson plan in a more balanced way. Perhaps you have sports or music lessons on a certain day and you need that day to be lighter—the lesson plans don't account for that. And while we do an entire day of school on Mondays, sometimes we are doing assignments from other days of the week, so if you are following the lesson plan exactly as given, your Tuesday might be a really huge day. I've had upper school kids complain that their Tuesday is a huge day because they have to do all that we didn't do on Monday and also all of Tuesday. Using this planner allows you to balance out the week in a way that will work for you and also puts them in charge of their week (with your guidance). Also, the teachers will assign assignments that are not in the student planner. Being able to write this in, and other items like

Complete First Form Latin Set – Trust me you need the whole set. This is the course where 5th graders start (if they didn't do Latina Christiana that's fine—it is not a prerequisite to First Form Latin). **They will come to class having watched the video for the week. We expect our moms to also watch as well.** You are not required to do the workbooks like the students nor memorize the words, but we ask that all homeschool parents begin the process of *understanding* Latin as we are not a 5 day a week school and you are required to teach your child some in latin. You don't have to know Latin to teach it—but you do need to know where to point them if they need to relearn something. By 4th/5th grade I let my kids read the history read alouds independently.

The literature read alouds we read together always. Lots of amazing discussion points. Typically a little above their reading level so good for read alouds though. Great moral stories. Such good family memories reading together!

These books will drop off in the 7th grade curriculum so treasure the read aloud time together! They can nearly all easily be found on ebay.com or thriftbooks.com or library.

D'Aulaires Greek Myths– This picture book is excellent. I would recommend reading it by 7th grade though as they'll review it some in Famous Men of Greece and then also gives great perspective to the Iliad and Odyssey they read in 8th.

While the lesson plans I mentioned above are SO incredibly helpful, if you follow them to a T it may not work very well for your life. Last year, I tried using this student planner with my upper school kids and they at first didn't see the point. They said, "We already have the lesson plans, why do we need this?" And I explained to them that it is in their benefit to assign the assignments from the lesson plan in a more balanced way. Perhaps you have sports or music lessons on a certain day and you need that day to be lighter—the lesson plans don't account for that. And while we do an entire day of school on Mondays, sometimes we are doing assignments from other days of the week, so if you are following the lesson plan exactly as given your Tuesday might be a really huge day. I've had upper school kids complain that their Tuesday is a huge day because they have to do all that we didn't do on Monday and also all of Tuesday. Using this planner allows you to balance out the week in a way that will work for you and also puts them in charge of their week (with your guidance). Also, the teachers will assign assignments that are not in the student planner. Being able to write this in, and other items like

So even though we won't be doing the Gospels for a while, we are always thinking about Jesus and what this text means in the grand plan of our walk with Jesus. We made great effort to ensure that the Bible homework reading will be predictable (around 30 min a week).

Complete Third Form Latin Set – Trust me you need the whole set. If they didn't do Latina Christiana that's fine—it is not a prerequisite to First Form Latin—but if they haven't done First Form Latin that is the class they will start on. Like math, latin builds. They will come to class having watched the video. We expect our moms to also watch as well. You are not required to do the workbooks like the students nor memorize the words, but we ask that all homeschool parents begin the process of *understanding* latin as we are not a 5 day a week school and you are required to teach your child some in latin. You don't have to know latin to teach it—but you do need to know where to point them if they need to relearn something. I don't expect you to memorize a declension but I expect you to know what it is and where to point your student to it if they need to review. Same with conjugations. Same with vocab. - **Prerequisites for those who don't have any prior reading in Greek Myths or Ancient Greek History:**
 - We highly recommend that your student reads *Famous Men of Greece* and *The Trojan War* prior to the start of the class if the student has no background in the ancient world.
 - If those texts are more than you can do in the summer, at minimum you can do **D'Aulaires's Greek Myths**- if they don't have any previous background on Greek mythology, this is a great starter book. It is an excellent picture book we use in 3rd/4th grades that even rising 8th graders will find interesting. It is an easy fun read (maybe in 1 or 2 afternoons) and gives great perspective to the Iliad and Odyssey they read in 8th. It is very appropriate for all ages.
 - Why Greek Myths in a Classical Christian education? Greek Myths show up everywhere in our American culture (references in literature and life such as "Achilles Heel", "Muses", "Cupid", "Trojan Horse" and so many more) as well as Shakespeare and other classical authors mention them extensively. The older writers will mention the Greek Myths and assume that you have an understanding of them. They'll drop names and offer no explanation. So it's very good to have a working understanding of them to understand and appreciate classical texts. And in the Iliad and the Odyssey there will have a lot of Greek mythology in it, the gods are big players in these books. It is an epic written in a poetic format, a very appropriate read for an 8th grader but nevertheless will challenge them. Having a working understanding of the gods going into the epic will give them a leg up.

Literature/Poetry

Such a great year—probably my favorite! We will cover American classics. The students will come to class having read the assigned chapter, gone over the vocab in the student guide and the comprehension questions and come ready to discuss in a Socratic discussion.

Get these sets (student book and textbook—optional is the teacher guide) Note: It does help if we all have the same edition as the text because the teacher may say "flip to such and such page". The teacher manual will have the answers and tell the teacher what page the answer is on. He or she may refer students to look at a certain page.

While the lesson plans I mentioned above are SO incredibly helpful, if you follow them to a T it may not work very well for your life. Last year, I tried using this student planner with my upper school kids and they at first didn't see the point. They said, "We already have the lesson plans, why do we need this?" And I explained to them that it is in their benefit to assign the assignments from the lesson plan in a more balanced way. Perhaps you have sports or music lessons on a certain day and you need that day to be lighter—the lesson plans don't account for that. And while we do an entire day of school on Mondays, sometimes we are doing assignments from other days of the week, so if you are following the lesson plan exactly as given your Tuesday might be a really huge day. I've had upper school kids complain that their Tuesday is a huge day because they have to do all that we didn't do on Monday and also all of Tuesday. Using this planner allows you to balance out the week in a way that will work for you and also puts them in charge of their week (with your guidance). Also, the teachers will assign assignments that are not in the student planner. Being able to write this in, and other items like

Bible-Christian Studies

The Amazing Collection student book will be very useful to assist students when they have their homework reading. To accomplish the goal of reading the entire Bible in 6 years (with summers off) students will be asked to read a small amount each week at home (about 30 min a week) without a teacher guiding them. The student book has maps and also Bible verses "baked" in so that will be really wonderful. We will quiz over Bible verses in class, they can earn house points. For many students it will be very helpful as it will assist students with their Bible reading homework so they have an understanding of what they are reading at home. For 2025-2026 All 7th-12th (Upper School) Bible classes will be going through the same 5 books of the Bible this year: Joshua-2 Kings: "The Kingdom Books". But what I love is that no matter what book they are in—the curriculum makes great effort to tie what they are learning back to the greater salvation message. So even though we won't be doing the Gospels for a while, we are always thinking about Jesus and what this text means in the grand plan of our walk with Jesus. We made great effort to ensure that the Bible homework reading will be predictable (around 30 min a week).

What about Spelling and Grammar? Memoria Press Concludes Spelling in 7th grade. We appreciate that as it makes way for more time for higher levels of studies. I just always tell my kids “never let yourself spell a word incorrectly” and so we continue perfecting our spelling that way. I also never will allow them to spell a word incorrectly, whether it is a short note they’ve written, a letter to a friend, anything.

Formal English Grammar, as a class subject, concludes in 8th grade for Memoria Press. But students will continue to learn grammar in Latin and Greek (which really is the best way to learn grammar. Grammar never made sense to me until I took Greek in college).

To accomplish the goal of reading the entire Bible in 6 years (with summers off) students will be asked to read a small amount each week at home (about 30 min a week) without a teacher guiding them. The student book has maps and also Bible verses "baked" in so that will be really wonderful. We will quiz over Bible verses in class, they can earn house points. For many students it will be very helpful as it will assist students with their Bible reading homework so they have an understanding of what they are reading at home. 1. Subject: Bible with teaching guided by *The Amazing Collection*
2. Grade/Level: 7th-12th Grade
3. Objective: Complete a thorough study of the sixty-six books of the Bible while reading the text of Scripture along the way.
4. Time Allotment: Monday classes from 9:20-10AM for teaching + discussion; at-home Bible Reading Plan based on approximately 30 minutes of reading per week for the in-session Excelsior meeting months (a very minimal amount of reading with summers off to accomplish reading the entire Bible in 6 years during co-op).

Six Year Plan

Beginning in 7th grade, students will “on board” at any level depending on what we are offering that year. They do not have to start at “the beginning.” Should students join after 7th grade and want to try and still read the entire Bible and thus earn the Bible award, they can use this schedule to see what the future projections are and what they would need to read to complete the entire Bible.

Year 1: Pentateuch (2024-2025)

- Set 1: Genesis, Exodus, Leviticus, Numbers, Deuteronomy

Year 2: Kingdom Books (2025-2026)

- Set 2: Joshua, Judges, Ruth, 1 + 2 Samuel, 1 + 2 Kings

Year 3: Post-Exilic Books + Poetical Books (2026-2027)

- Set 3: 1 + 2 Chronicles, Ezra, Nehemiah, Esther
- Set 4: Job, Psalms, Proverbs, Ecclesiastes, Song of Solomon

Year 4 : Major Prophets (2027-2028)

- Set 5: Isaiah, Jeremiah, Lamentations, Ezekiel, Daniel

Math Recommendations

Here are my recommendations— I will add to these as I get reviews from other mothers on what worked and what they like:

Easier Math Curriculums:

Math U See - Daily Workload (15-20 problems depending on level)

(Pauline's review - I have used this curriculum at every level through Algebra 2)

Positives: Christian owner and creator. Uses math manipulatives designed by Steve Demme that help you see what you are learning. If you are looking for a lighter, less intense curriculum, this is a very, very good one. And it goes all the way to calculus so you have continuity. Very low parent involvement. The kids can watch the 5-10 min video and do the lesson. However, once they get to Algebra, you really should do the teacher key practice problems with them. A 10 min video is not sufficient to teach the method. Also, as they get older, they must be taught that they need to pause the video and work the problems as he is teaching them. The problems are far too complex to sit and just watch, they really need to treat his videos like a class.

Downsides: You'll need to work out how you use the answer key— I often let my own children check and sometimes they would be tempted to cheat and then I'd have to take the answer key away and manually grade myself. Then I'd get behind on grading so they weren't getting the immediate feedback they needed.

With so few problems you can't cover as much ground as some of the rigorous ones. It is probably not the curriculum to choose if students are looking to be highly competitive on math (such as the SAT) or if you need a lot of accountability (at this time there is no digital support system). I have done Math U See classes with Veritas Press but was disappointed as the teachers didn't really teach the method (they just taught how they knew) and it was very expensive, and, like a normal school, we had to follow their calendar which was tough with vacations.

Ultimately I switched to Nicole the Math Lady as 1) my first two children did not do well on the math portion of the SAT and I felt like they were under prepared—partially because the curriculum was on the easier side, less drill, less repetition baked in, but also because 2) for years I needed MORE accountability. Math would fall off the wagon a lot. When digital components that provide grading/accountability/immediate feedback started surfacing for math I knew this is what I needed and Math U See didn't have anything like that in the works.

Medium Level Math

Rod and Staff

(I have never used but have seen the first and second grade books since it is what MP recommends and I taught it some 2 years at Excelsior -if someone wanted to add to this review it would be helpful)

Rod and Staff is what is recommended by MP. It is a good classic math curriculum. At kindergarten level it's not too much—2 pages big font. By 2nd grade it can be 3 pages of math problems - twice as much as Math U See. They place a lot of emphasis on drill work. Drill, drill, drill. A child given to

daydreaming can take 30-60 min to complete with plenty of nagging. It can be a chore. It feels like a repeat to what is in their Math Challenge books. And then Rod and Staff has their own drill books. I have moms who really have liked R&S. By 6th grade MP has you switch to a new curriculum. There are games in the teacher manual you are supposed to play, as well as teacher instruction. There is no digital support (it is created by Mennonites).

For K-6 I would recommend Singapore over this math at this time of my review.

Harder, more rigorous (also covers more ground):

Singapore Math (through 5th or 6th grade)

(Pauline's review)

Positives: Designed by a woman who grew up in Singapore (one of the wealthiest countries per capita—it's a separate country from China—a large island below Malaysia, south of Thailand). Singapore math is based on Western Math, but they have perfected it, and they have some of the best testing math students in the world. (As of 2026 I have used 1st, 2nd, and 3rd grade and been highly impressed). It really focuses on training your student to do mental math. I highly recommend using with Nicole the Math Lady (she teaches the lesson (recorded), she'll stop and have them enter an answer as she teaches, then continue on. After lesson, they will enter their answers into a computer or Ipad works too, so you get an email when they complete the daily assignment, what problems they missed, what chapters they came from, in doing so they get immediate feedback if wrong or right). You must use the version called "Dimensions". It is the original version, it only goes to 5th grade. They have a newer US version called "Primary Mathematics" and that one goes to 6th grade. Nicole the Math Lady uses "Dimensions".

It is a better curriculum than Math U See in terms of covering more ground and teaching students to see the problems. In Math U See, there was only one way to "see" the math (using his manipulatives) but in Singapore they "see" the math too, but they will show it in many different ways using all the manipulatives you buy and also on paper visually. You really want to get the classroom teacher manual (they sell these through their website or even at many homeschool stores). They often sell you the homeschool teacher guide but the classroom one has games and is in color so it matches the lesson pages making it easier to find your way around, you really just want that one. I find the games are like using flashcards, and though they take extra time to do, they are highly effective of hammering home the concept but through play.

Downsides: You shouldn't switch to this curriculum if you are starting after 3rd grade. 3rd grade is really the limit to pick up their methods. You also have to invest in a ton of little math manipulatives. Using the teacher guide, the games will call for all sorts of different little things. Which is fun, but an investment to shop and store all the things. It has easily 4-5x as many problems as Math U See. You have a color lesson book, that Nicole the Math Lady teaches from (or you teach from) and these are meant to be guided practice problems. Then you play a game (you really should play the games—they are awesome and in the classroom teacher manuals only), and then you head to the black and white student workbook where they actually do the homework. Math will take an hour+ even in 1st grade, whereas Math U See might be 20 min.

Saxon

Upsides (and intro): This curriculum has been around since the 1980's, created by John Saxon. It is a no-nonsense highly rigorous curriculum. It has double the problems that were in the Math U See book and they are challenging. Most of the private schools use Saxon. For so long, I'd hear moms coming from Great Hearts (or other private schools) to homeschooling and try Saxon and struggle and ultimately give up. And I see why-- It is MUCH harder (twice as many problems but covers far more ground) than Math U See-- however, with the support of Nicole the Math Lady (she teaches the lesson (recorded), she'll stop and have them enter an answer as she teaches, then continue on. After lesson, they will enter their answers into a computer or Ipad works too, so you get an email when they complete the daily assignment, what problems they missed, what chapters they came from, in doing so they get immediate feedback if wrong or right) — all these things that have been lacking with Math U See for me, makes it doable. I also really like how all the homework has, next to each problem number, what chapter that content came from in case you need to review. It is a little thing but oh so helpful!

Time will tell if it actually does help on the SAT (so not yet sure if that is the magic bullet)—and then you have to decide if you care that much about the SAT too. But if you are looking for a rigorous math curriculum - this is it.

Downsides: It takes twice as long as Math U See. Maybe 3x as long some days. There are definitely way more problems. You aren't supposed to write in the book (but by the time we got to Algebra there really wasn't room to write in the book in Math U see either). I had a hard time keeping up with Math U See without any digital accountability, I'm not sure how anyone would keep up with Saxon without it, unless maybe that was an area that you were just naturally good at (a good habit of grading daily etc).

My current recommendation:

I personally recommend using Singapore through 5th grade and then switching to Saxon. Singapore Dimensions only goes to 5th grade anyway. It gives them that strong foundation of mental math and then when it is time to switch, Saxon does a good job of covering the upper levels of math.
